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## Guidelines for the Creation of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Submission of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) in Accredited Institutions

## Introduction

In pursuance of its Action Plan for performance evaluation, assessment and accreditation and quality up-gradation of institutions of higher education, the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore proposes that every accredited institution should establish an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) as a post-accreditation quality sustenance measure. Since quality enhancement is a continuous process, the IQAC will become a part of the institution's system and work towards realisation of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. The prime task of the IQAC is to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic improvement in the overall performance of institutions. For this, during the post-accreditation period, it will channelize all efforts and measures of the institution towards promoting its holistic academic excellence.

The guidelines provided in the following pages will guide and facilitate the institution in the creation and operation of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The work of the IQAC is the first step towards internalization and institutionalization of quality enhancement initiatives. Its success depends upon the sense of belongingness and participation it can inculcate in all the constituents of the institution. It will not be yet another hierarchical structure or a record-keeping exercise in the institution. It will be a facilitative and participative voluntary system/unit/organ of the institution. It has the potential to become a vehicle for ushering in quality enhancement by working out planned interventionist strategies to remove deficiencies and enhance quality like the "Quality Circles" in industries.

## Objective

The primary aim of IQAC is

- To develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution.
- To promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality enhancement through internalization of quality culture and institutionalization of best practices.

## **Strategies**

## IQAC shall evolve mechanisms and procedures for

a) Ensuring timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks;

- b) The relevance and quality of academic and research programmes;
- c) Equitable access to and affordability of academic programmes for various sections of society;
- d) Optimization and integration of modern methods of teaching and learning;
- e) The credibility of evaluation procedures;
- f) Ensuring the adequacy, maintenance and proper allocation of support structure and services;
- g) Sharing of research findings and networking with other institutions in India and abroad.

## **Functions**

### Some of the functions expected of the IQAC are:

- a) Development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for various academic and administrative activities of the institution;
- b) Facilitating the creation of a learner-centric environment conducive to quality education and faculty maturation to adopt the required knowledge and technology for participatory teaching and learning process;
- c) Arrangement for feedback response from students, parents and other stakeholders on quality-related institutional processes;
- d) Dissemination of information on various quality parameters of higher education;
- e) Organization of inter and intra institutional workshops, seminars on quality related themes and promotion of quality circles;
- f) Documentation of the various programmes/activities leading to quality improvement;
- g) Acting as a nodal agency of the Institution for coordinating quality-related activities, including adoption and dissemination of best practices;
- h) Development and maintenance of institutional database through MIS for the purpose of maintaining /enhancing the institutional quality;
- i) Development of Quality Culture in the institution;
- j) Preparation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per guidelines and parameters of NAAC, to be submitted to NAAC.

## Benefits

### *IQAC* will facilitate / contribute

- a) Ensure heightened level of clarity and focus in institutional functioning towards quality enhancement;
- b) Ensure internalization of the quality culture;
- b) Ensure enhancement and coordination among various activities of the institution and institutionalize all good practices;
- c) Provide a sound basis for decision-making to improve institutional functioning;

- d) Act as a dynamic system for quality changes in HEIs;
- e) Build an organised methodology of documentation and internal communication.

## Composition of the IQAC

IQAC may be constituted in every institution under the Chairmanship of the Head of the institution with heads of important academic and administrative units and a few teachers and a few distinguished educationists and representatives of local management and stakeholders.

The composition of the IQAC may be as follows:

- 1. Chairperson: Head of the Institution
- 2. A few senior administrative officers
- 3. Three to eight teachers
- 4. One member from the Management
- 5. One/two nominees from local society, Students and Alumni
- 6. One/two nominees from Employers /Industrialists/stakeholders
- 7. One of the senior teachers as the coordinator/Director of the IQAC

The composition of the IQAC will depend on the size and complexity of the institution. It helps the institutions in planning and monitoring. IQAC also gives stakeholders or beneficiaries a cross-sectional participation in the institution's quality enhancement activities. The guidelines given here are only indicative and will help the institutions for quality sustenance activities.

The membership of such nominated members shall be for a period of two years. The IQAC should meet at least once in every quarter. The quorum for the meeting shall be two-third of the total number of members. The agenda, minutes and Action Taken Reports are to be documented with official signatures and maintained electronically in a retrievable format.

It is necessary for the members of the IQAC to shoulder the responsibilities of generating and promoting awareness in the institution and to devote time for working out the procedural details. While selecting these members several precautions need to be taken. A few of them are listed below:

- It is advisable to choose persons from various backgrounds who have earned respect for integrity and excellence in their teaching and research. Moreover, they should be aware of the ground realities of the institutional environment. They should be known for their commitment to improving the quality of teaching and learning.
- It would be appropriate to choose as senior administrators, persons in charge of institutional services such as library, computer centre, estate, student welfare, administration, academic tasks, examination and planning and development.

• The management representative should be a person who is aware of the institution's objectives, limitations and strengths and is committed to its improvement. The local society representatives should be of high social standing and should have made significant contributions to society and in particular to education.

## The role of coordinator

The role of the coordinator of the IQAC is crucial in ensuring the effective functioning of all the members. The coordinator of the IQAC may be a senior person with expertise in quality aspects. She/he may be a full-time functionary or, to start with, she/he may be a senior academic /administrator entrusted with the IQAC as an additional responsibility. Secretarial assistance may be facilitated by the administration. It is preferable that the coordinator may have sound knowledge about the computer, its various functions and usage for effective communication.

## **Operational Features of the IQAC**

Quality assurance is a by-product of ongoing efforts to define the objectives of an institution, to have a work plan to achieve them and to specify the checks and balances to evaluate the degree to which each of the tasks is fulfilled. Hence devotion and commitment to improvement rather than mere institutional control is the basis for devising procedures and instruments for assuring quality. The right balance between the health and growth of an institution needs to be struck. The IQAC has to ensure that whatever is done in the institution for "education" is done efficiently and effectively with high standards. In order to do this, the IQAC will have to first establish procedures and modalities to collect data and information on various aspects of institutional functioning.

The coordinator of the IQAC and the secretary will have a major role in implementing these functions. The IQAC may derive major support from the already existing units and mechanisms that contribute to the functions listed above. The operational features and functions discussed so far are broad-based to facilitate institutions towards academic excellence and institutions may adapt them to their specific needs.

## **Monitoring Mechanism**

The institutions need to submit yearly the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) to NAAC. A functional Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and timely submission of Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQARs) are the Minimum Institutional Requirements (MIR) to volunteer for second, third or subsequent cycle's accreditation. During the institutional visit the NAAC peer teams will interact with the IQACs to know the progress, functioning as well quality sustenance initiatives undertaken by them.

The Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) may be the part of the Annual Report. The AQAR shall be approved by the statutory bodies of the HEIs (such as Syndicate, Governing Council/Board) for the follow up action for necessary quality enhancement measures.

The Higher Education Institutions (HEI) shall submit the AQAR regularly to NAAC. The IQACs may create its exclusive window on its institutional website and regularly upload/ report on its activities, as well as for hosting the AQAR.

The NAAC Accredited institutions need to submit only the soft copy as word file (.doc/.docx) through e-mail (<u>naac.aqar@gmail.com</u>). The file name needs to be submitted with Track ID of the institution and College Name. For example MHCOGN16601-Samudra Arts and Science College, Taliamegu-Maharashtra.doc. The Higher Education Institutions need not submit the printed/hard copy to NAAC. The acknowledgements would be sent to the institutions through e-mail.

## The Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) of the IQAC

All NAAC accredited institutions will submit an annual self-reviewed progress report to NAAC, through its IQAC. The report is to detail the tangible results achieved in key areas, specifically identified by the institutional IQAC at the beginning of the academic year. The AQAR will detail the results of the perspective plan worked out by the IQAC. (*Note: The AQAR period would be the Academic Year. For example, July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013*)



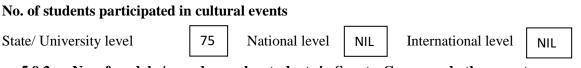

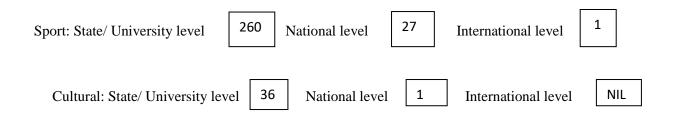

### 5.9.2 No. of medals /awards won by students in Sports, Games and other events



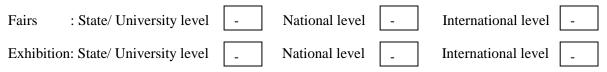

- Monthly attendance record is maintained to identify students who are irregular. Data and information on academic performance of students is maintained in order to identify slow learners and meritorious students for appropriate assistance.
- The students doing exceptionally well in the university and College exams are felicitated during the Annual Prize Distribution Function. Special merit scholarships are awarded to University toppers.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The College strictly follows examination and evaluation schedule set by Panjab University, Chandigarh .The examination and evaluation schedule is mentioned in the College calendar.

- Mid semester exams, class tests, surprise tests (oral& written) are conducted for continuous evaluation of the students.
- Special retests are conducted for students who are unable to take their Mid-Semester tests( e.g sports women who participate in various tournaments)
- Internal Assessment is based on the criteria of attendance, submission of assignments, marks in the tests and classroom participation.
- Grievances related to the marks and internal assessments are taken care of.
- Parent Teacher Meetings are held to inform about the student's performance and attendance.

IQAC along with the Research Committee encourage the staff for research related activities.

The library of College has subscribed National/ International e-journals in various subjects to which everyone has free access.

#### 1. Title of the Practice

#### ENHANCING GENDER SENSITIVITY AND EMPOWERMENT

#### 2. Objectives of the Practice

The College since its inception has been committed to the cause of gender justice and equality. We strongly believe that it is the fundamental responsibility of educational institutions, particularly women colleges to combat gender discrimination and lead the process of sensitivity and women empowerment. The goal has been to equip the students with the necessary information and knowledge to help them become aware, active and empowered citizens who significantly contribute in the process of nation-building. It is visualized as a goal of the College to transform the young minds and implement a policy of zero tolerance for gender-based violence, discrimination and harassment.

#### 3. The Context

The College has taken it upon itself to play an active role towards building a gender-sensitive and gender-equal system. The patriarchal ideology is deeply embedded in our social systems, particularly in the context of India and it requires a huge amount of effort to challenge it. It is, therefore, important to enable the students to take the lead themselves towards building a humane and just society free from any kind of gender discrimination. The College, through various activities focuses on this important issue that requires a serious consideration. It ensures that students develop an ability examine and interpret the key gender related issues affecting the members of society.

#### 4. The Practice

The College has taken a number of initiatives to encourage the students to break the cultures of silence surrounding gender-based discrimination, abuse and violence. The College has been providing various platforms to students through conducting a number of seminars, workshops and talks where the students get opportunities to cultivate democratic knowledge, skills, values and practice for empowering themselves. The College has a Gender Champion's Club that held its investiture ceremony in September 2017. The main focus of the club is towards exposing the students to various gender related issues and challenges and make them aware about the same. The Club has been active in spreading information on reproductive hygiene and organized an expert lecture by Dr. Madhu Gupta on 'Reproductive Health of Adolescent Girls' during the investiture ceremony.

The College organized a quiz on 'Women's Legal Rights in India' in November 2017 in order to make the students aware about the various legal provisions available in the country related to the topic. The Legal Literacy Cell organized a lecture on 'Property Rights: A Key to Women Empowerment'by Dr. Supinder Kaur in March 2018 where the students got legal information related to their property rights. The College organized an interactive talk with Dr. Jyoti Seth on 'Gender Based Violence' in March 2018 in which she spoke about the legal aspects specifically in the context of cyber laws. An expert lecture was delivered by Dr. Savneet on 'Impact of Social Well-Being on Quality of Life of Adolescent Girls' in March 2018.

One of the major ways to empower young girls and help them become independent is through education. The College ensures that students from economically weaker backgrounds are provided with financial aid in the form of various scholarships to support them in their education. Various kinds of scholarships by the government, NGOs and private scholarships are awarded to the students for this purpose. Individual philanthropists and faculty of the college also actively award scholarships to the meritorious and financially weaker students to help them continue with their education. Many such scholarships were awarded to the students during the session

#### 5. Evidence of Success

One of the major achievements is to instill the courage in young girls to voice their concerns in a fearless manner. During the discussions in the workshops and talks, the students actively participate, question the established norms that legitimize gender discrimination and stand for women empowerment and social change. The follow-up debates in the classrooms further enhances their academic understandings about the issue and equips them with the various tools through which they can have a comprehensive understanding about the subject.

The consistent and increasing participation of the students in the practice indicates the success of the College in motivating and transforming them into active and dynamic citizens. The sensitivity and guidance of the College administration and the faculty in the everyday lives and problems of the students further encourages them to confront any form of discrimination and exercise their agency for their empowerment. The various kinds of scholarships that the students receive through the College act as a tremendous financial support for the meritorious and economically weaker students to complete their education and thus open new opportunities for them.

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The process of generating and getting funds required for organizing various activities is often a tough and gigantic task. However, the faculty has been working hard to resolve these challenges and has been, to an extent, successful in organizing various activities related to the practice. The other challenge faced is the reluctance among the girls to disclose their problems because of the stigma attached with issue. The College has been making sincere efforts to instill confidence and trust among them so that they are able to freely share any form of harassment or violence they are facing and guide them through it. We believe that it is the prime responsibility of the educators and academic institutions to nurture the ideals of gender equality, freedom and sensitivity to bring about concrete transformations in our society.

#### 7. Notes (Optional)

The College is consistently and continuously involved and committed to the practice of integrating concerns about the gender issues into every aspect of the campus, be it academic or extracurricular activities. Every activity or event is seriously deliberated upon before enactment. This can thus act as a blueprint for other institutions to emulate.

7.4Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

1. Title- 'Bhagvani': Clean & Green Campus

**2. Objective of the Practice**- The chief objective of 'Clean & Green' initiative, the institution provides surroundings which cleanses the mind from anomalies of human nature/ behavior leading to enhancing the self-esteem, confidence of the young students becoming the harbinger of holistic development.

**2.The Context-** It is well-known fact that contact with nature can be balm to those who are stressed or fatigued. Thus, the design of a campus must incorporate other aspects apart from simply providing a place of study. Open green spaces can provide an aesthetic and healing environment. The natural scenery and relaxing atmosphere in open spaces encourage impromptu meetings and discussions, and provide fresh air for stressed scholars.

**3.The Practice-** Keeping the objective of the initiative in mind, Institution had established 'Bhagvani Club' in the year 2008 ensuring the overall maintenance of college- grounds with an active involvement of students as well. A devoted team, has been looking after the upkeep and beautification of green spaces and landscape of the College campus, which is one of the best healthy practices and sustainable initiative adopted by the Institution.

Not just the dedicated team of 'Baghvani', students also takes active part in enhancing the impact of initiative, with a keen interest in gardening take active part and at many occasions have planted the samplings and pots to the existing vault of collection.

Institution maintains a rich variety of flowering and non-flowering plants, both seasonal and perennial, which are grown in flower-beds as well as in pots.

**4. Evidence of Success-** Institution has consistently incorporated maintenance of green spaces on its campus. The dedication of the 'Bhagvani' team has reaped rich rewards by winning the title of 'Best Maintained College Lawns' in the Rose Festival organized by Chandigarh Administration since the inception of the practice that is from 2008 to till date, held in the month of February every year. Institution feels pride in not only beautification of the campus but also in educating students, staff and gardeners about water – conservation. Only recycled and treated water is used the entire year-round. An organic compost-pit has also been as successful initiative which serves as a source of rich manure.

- In the year 2018 the college came Second in the large Garden Competition at the Annual Rose Festival, held on 23-25<sup>th</sup> February 2018 organized by Municipal Corporation Chandigarh.
- The institution also won the first Prize in the Stock Double (C-3) at the same festival.
- Efforts have been initiated for a Herbal Garden in the College.

**5. Problems Encountered and Resources required-** Due to watering the lawn with tertiary and treated water has affected the quality of the landscape giving way to growing of wild plants and weeds.

• Besides this, problem is being faced with respect to civil work that is need of adequate paths, construction of pavement and boundary walls have been a consistent concern of the team 'Bhagvani'.

#### PARENTS FEEDBACK FORM

#### I. Are you satisfied with your child's performance?

83.34 % parents were satisfied with their ward's performance whereas only 17.07 % expressed dissatisfaction.

#### Do you think the college is making adequate efforts to bring out the best in your child?

All parents believe that the college is making sufficient efforts for their ward's progress and development.

#### II. Would you like such parent teacher meetings to be held in future?

100% parents agreed that such parent teacher meetings should be a regular feature and held more often.

#### **III.** Are you satisfied with your interaction with the teacher(s)?

All the parents were satisfied with the Parent- Teacher meeting and their subsequent interaction with the teacher(s).

#### The parents further gave the following suggestions:

- 1. To hold Parent Teacher Meetings frequently.
- 2. The performance of their wards should be informed regularly.
- 3. Online facility of payment of fees should be there.
- 4. A facility of online updation of attendance of their wards should be made available.
- 5. To conduct mentoring sessions frequently.

#### STUDENTS FEEDBACK FORM:

#### I. How regular is your teacher in the class?

92.86% students agreed that teachers are always regular for the class.

#### **II.** How punctual is the teacher in your class?

89.07 % students said that their teachers were always punctual.

#### III. How thorough is your teacher with the concepts and topics of the paper?

90.12% students agreed that their teacher has complete clarity about the subject concepts whereas only 2.19% students said the teachers have less clarity. Rest of the students were found to be neutral in opinion.

#### IV. Is the teacher able to maintain discipline in the class?

All the students were of the opinion that the teacher maintained complete discipline in class.

#### V. How knowledgeable is your teacher in general?

According to a majority of the students (96.7%), teachers are well informed and knowledgeable in their field.

#### VI. How well does the teacher communicate in the class?

Almost all students (96.26%) were extremely satisfied with the teacher's communication skills and teaching methodology.

Feedback from students was collected and analyzed. The common issues/ suggestions were:

- To introduce ICT facilities for better understanding/ clarity of concepts.
- To improve condition of canteen and quality of the food served.
- To upgrade/ repair washrooms.
- Provision of high speed Wi-Fi on campus
- More Inter class competitions and industrial visits should be organized, to inculcate competitive spirit and practical knowledge in the students.

#### **TEACHERS FEEDBACK FORM**

#### I. Syllabus is relevant and need based

31.66% teachers agreed that the syllabus is relevant and need based, while41.67% teachers were neutral in opinion.Rest of the teachers (26.67%) held that the syllabus needs major revamping and structural changes to make it more appropriate and applicable.

# II. Adequate number of books, journals and e- learning resources are available in the library

Most of the teachers (78.33%) strongly agreed that adequate number of books, journals and e- learning resources are available in the library, whereas only 6.66% teachers opined that more resources should be added to the existing ones.

#### III. Wi- Fi/ Internet facility is provided

A large number of the teachers (71.67%) said that the Wi-Fi/ Internet facility provided is satisfactory, whereas a few (6.67%) felt that the service was erratic and the quality needed to be improved.

#### IV. Smart classrooms and ICT enabled classrooms are available

76.67% teachers said that smart classrooms and ICT enabled classrooms are available for their use but 8.33% suggested that the facility of smart class rooms should be made available in every classroom.

# V. There is autonomy regarding classroom decisions and freedom to choose style of teaching

Most of the teachers (83.33%) teachers opined that they exercised autonomy in the classroom and their teaching style is chosen by them at their own discretion while only a few (8.34%) disagreed.

#### VI. Environment of the college is conducive to teaching and research

A positive response was given by most of the teachers (70.77%) as they find the atmosphere of the college conducive both for the teaching as well as research purpose, 18.33% teachers were neutral.

Only 10.9% teachers disagreed to the conduciveness in the teaching and research environment in the college.

#### VII. Administration/ management is teacher friendly and encouraging

Most of the teachers (76.67%)held a positive opinion about the friendliness and motivating behaviour of the administration/ management. 23.33% teachers were neutral in this regard.

#### VIII. Head of the institute is supportive and redresses grievances of the staff

Almost all the teachers (96.66%) teachers approved the supportive behaviour of the head of the institute and that the grievances and rightly redressed for them.

#### IX. Suggestions:

- a) Student skill improvement programs should be introduced.
- b) Automated/ online attendance should be initiated.
- c) Research facilities should be provided to encourage research culture in the faculty.
- d) Proper planning of course and student development should be there.
- e) Syllabus should be regularly revised/ updated to make it more relevant and impart practical knowledge to the students.
- f) Improved Wi- fi facility should be there in the college premises.
- g) Better washroom facilities should be provided to teachers as well as the students.

#### ALUMNI RESPONSE

#### Alumni are asked to make suggestions when they come for alumni meet or online. Following are some of the suggestions made by the alumni.

- a) Alumni meet should be held regularly.
- b) Infrastructure of the college should be improved.
- c) Better parking facility.
